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## NATIONAL EDUCATION POLICY 2020

The Union Cabinet chaired by the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi approved the National Education Policy 2020, making way for large scale, transformational reforms in both school and higher education sectors. This is the first education policy of the 21st century and replaces the thirty-four year old National Policy on Education (NPE), 1986. Built on the foundational pillars of **Access, Equity, Quality, Affordability and Accountability**, this policy is aligned to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and aims to transform India into a vibrant knowledge society and global knowledge superpower by making both school and college education more holistic, flexible, multidisciplinary, suited to 21st century needs and aimed at bringing out the unique capabilities of each student.

### National Education Policy 2020 in Brief:

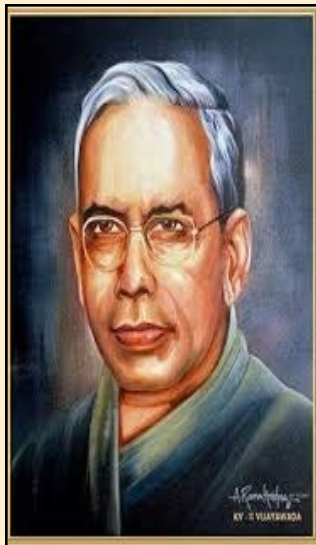
- ◆ **New Policy aims for Universalization of Education from pre-school to secondary level with 100 % GER in school education by 2030.**
- ◆ **NEP 2020 will bring 2 crore out of school children back into the main stream.**
- ◆ **New 5+3+3+4 school curriculum with 12 years of schooling and 3 years of Anganwadi/ Pre-schooling.**
- ◆ **Emphasis on Foundational Literacy and Numeracy, no rigid separation between academic streams, extracurricular, vocational streams in schools ; Vocational Education to start from Class 6 with Internships.**
- ◆ **Teaching upto at least Grade 5 to be in mother tongue/ regional language.**
- ◆ **Assessment reforms with 360 degree Holistic Progress Card, tracking Student Progress for achieving Learning Outcomes.**
- ◆ **GER in higher education to be raised to 50 % by 2035 ; 3.5 crore seats to be added in higher education.**
- ◆ **Higher Education curriculum to have Flexibility of Subjects.**
- ◆ **Multiple Entry / Exit to be allowed with appropriate certification.**
- ◆ **Academic Bank of Credits to be established to facilitate Transfer of Credits.**
- ◆ **National Research Foundation to be established to foster a strong research culture.**
- ◆ **Light but Tight Regulation of Higher Education, single regulator with four separate verticals for different functions.**
- ◆ **Affiliation System to be phased out in 15 years with graded autonomy to colleges.**
- ◆ **NEP 2020 advocates increased use of technology with equity; National Educational Technology Forum to be created.**
- ◆ **NEP 2020 emphasizes setting up of Gender Inclusion Fund, Special Education Zones for disadvantaged regions and groups.**
- ◆ **New Policy promotes Multilingualism in both schools and HEs; National Institute for Pali, Persian and Prakrit , Indian Institute of Translation and Interpretation to be set up.**

### **Remembering Padma Shri Dr. S. R. Ranganathan on his 128th Birth Anniversary**

Dr. S. R. Ranganathan, has lion's share in the development of libraries in India. During his time there was a saying that **"for all advancements in Sciences, East used to look at the West; whereas, for advancements in Library Science, West used to look at the East"**

#### **Birth and Education**

August 12th is being celebrated as National Librarians' Day in India, as it marks the Birth Anniversary of Father of Library Science in India Dr. S. R. Ranganathan. He was born in Shiyali in Tanjavoor District of Tamil Nadu on 9th August 1892. He was educated at the Hindu High School in Shiyali. He completed his B.A. and M.A. in Mathematics in 1913 and 1916 respectively,

#### **Professional Life**

Dr. S. R. Ranganathan was a Mathematician who worked as a teacher in various colleges from 1917-1923, before he took up Librarianship as a career.

In 1924, University of Madras appointed Dr. S. R. Ranganathan as its first librarian which made him travel to England to study Librarianship at University College, London. After his arrival from London he took up the job of University Librarian at Madras University from 1925 till 1944. In 1945, he joined the Benaras Hindu University on the invitation of Dr. S. Radhakrishnan, who was its Vice-Chancellor then. In 1947, he joined the Delhi University as Honorary Professor on the request of Sir Maurice Gwyer, the eminent jurist, Chief Judge of Federal Courts and vice-Chancellor of Delhi University. Delhi University became the first in entire British Commonwealth, to institute Master and Doctoral degrees in Library Science. He was also engaged in research and writing from 1954-57 in Zürich. In 1962 he founded and became head of the Documentation Research and Training Centre in Bangalore, with which he remained associated for the rest of his life.

#### **Important Publications**

Dr. S. R. Ranganathan was a prolific writer and researcher; he continued to write and publish till the very end. During his lifetime he published over 60 books and 1500+ research papers/articles.

He published various books such as Colon Classification (1933), Classified Catalogue Code (1934), Prolegomena to Library Classification (1937), Theory of the Library Catalogue (1938), Elements of Library Classification (1945), Classification and International Documentation (1948), Classification and Communication (1951), and Headings and Canons (1955). His Five Laws of Library Science (1931) was widely accepted as a definitive statement of the ideal of library service. He also drafted plans for a national and several state library systems, founded and edited several journals, and was active in numerous professional associations.

#### **Major Contributions**

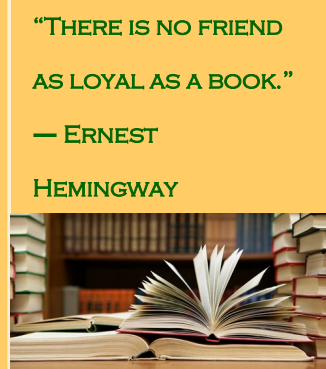
Dr. S. R. Ranganathan used the Madras University Library as a laboratory where he experimented with new tools and techniques and introduced measures to enhance the quality of library service. The university libraries became visible to the academic and research community and to academic administrators in India largely due to what Dr. S. R. Ranganathan did in the Madras University Library. With more than two decades of working experience in universities, and research in library science, Dr. S. R. Ranganathan's ideas were much sought after by many organizations not only in India, but throughout the western world. The organizations included UNESCO, ISO, ALA and library associations of several other countries, IFLA, FID, Rockefeller Foundation, UN Committee of International Library Experts and the British Council, to mention a few. Between 1948 and 1964 Dr. S. R. Ranganathan was largely on professional visits to Japan and many countries in Europe and North America.

**Dr. S. R. Ranganathan received many awards and acclaims for his contribution to the library field. Important among them Padma Shri in 1957, honorary DLitt from the University of Delhi (1948) and University of Pittsburgh (1964), National Research Professorship in Library Science in 1965 and many more.**

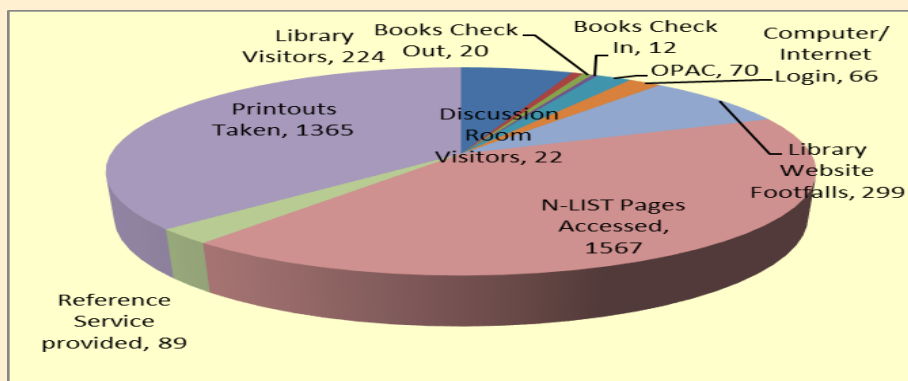

## NATIONAL DIGITAL LIBRARY OF INDIA (NDLI)



Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) under its National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NMEICT) has initiated the National Digital Library of India (NDLI) project to develop a framework of virtual repository of learning resources with a single-window search facility. NDLI is being developed at Indian Institute of Technology Kharagpur. It is designed to provide support for all academic levels including researchers and life-long learners, all disciplines, all popular forms of access devices and differently-abled learners. It is being developed to help students to prepare for entrance and competitive examinations, to enable people to learn and prepare from best practices from all over the world and to facilitate researchers to perform inter-linked exploration from multiple sources.

**NDLI Resources are freely available to the registered learners** and covers educational materials ranging from Primary to Postgraduate Level including resources in various forms, such as Books, Audio Books/Lectures, Video lectures, Lecture Presentations/Notes, Simulations, Question Papers, Solutions, etc. It gives access to various subject resources related to School, CBSE Exam preparation, Engineering, Science, Humanities, Literature, Law & Management.

### Indian Ecommerce Industry

The Indian e-commerce industry has been on an upward growth trajectory and is expected to surpass the US to become the second largest e-commerce market in the world by 2034. The e-commerce market is expected to reach Rs 13,97,800 crore (US\$ 200 billion) by 2027 from Rs 2,69,076.5 crore (US\$ 38.5 billion) in 2017, supported by rising income and surge in internet users. Online shoppers in India reached 120 million in 2018 and are expected to reach 220 million by 2025.

### Indian Ecommerce Industry Analysis

#### Growing Demand

- India is the fastest growing E-commerce market and is expected to grow at approximately 1,200 percent by 2026.
- Indian E-commerce market is expected to reach US\$ 84 billion by 2021.

### Abraham Lincoln Used the Telegraph to Help Win the Civil War

Nearly 150 years before the advent of texts, tweets and e-mail, President Abraham Lincoln became the first "wired president" by embracing the original electronic messaging technology—the telegraph. The 16th president may be remembered for his soaring oratory that stirred the Union, but the nearly 1,000 bite-sized telegrams that he wrote during his presidency helped win the Civil War by projecting presidential power in unprecedented fashion.

Lincoln, who had a keen interest in technology and remains the only American president with a patent, spent more of his presidency in the War Department's telegraph office than anywhere else outside of the White House, writes Tom Wheeler in Mr. Lincoln's T-Mails: How Abraham Lincoln Used the Telegraph to Win the Civil War. As a president who craved knowledge, he trod a well-worn path across the executive mansion's lawn to the War Department to monitor the latest intelligence arriving in dots and dashes.

David Homer Bates, one of the four original members of the U.S. Military Telegraph Corps, recounted in Lincoln in the Telegraph Room that several times a day, Lincoln sat down at a telegraph office desk near a window overlooking Pennsylvania Avenue and read through the fresh stack of incoming telegrams, which he called "lightning messages."

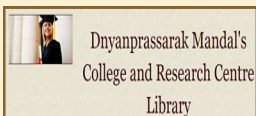
