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International Day of the Girl Child

Every year, 11th October is celebrated as the International Day of the Girl Child. The day aims to highlight and address the needs and challenges girls face, while promoting girls' empowerment and the fulfillment of their human rights. It celebrates the importance, power, and potential of girls around the world, and focuses attention on the particular problems they can face.

Background

In 1995 at the World Conference on Women in Beijing countries unanimously adopted the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action – the most progressive blueprint ever for advancing the rights of not only women but girls. The Beijing Declaration is the first to specifically call out girls' rights.

On December 19, 2011, United Nations General Assembly adopted Resolution 66/170 to declare October 11 as the International Day of the Girl Child, to recognize girls' rights and the unique challenges girls face around the world.

Adolescent girls have the right to a safe, educated, and healthy life, not only during these critical formative years, but also as they mature into women. If effectively supported during the adolescent years, girls have the potential to change the world – both as the empowered girls of today and as tomorrow's workers, mothers, entrepreneurs, mentors, household heads, and political leaders. An investment in realising the power of adolescent girls upholds their rights today and promises a more equitable and prosperous future, one in which half of humanity is an equal partner in solving the problems of climate change, political conflict, economic growth, disease prevention, and global sustainability.

Girls are breaking boundaries and barriers posed by stereotypes and exclusion, including those directed at children with disabilities and those living in marginalized communities. As entrepreneurs, innovators and initiators of global movements, girls are creating a world that is relevant for them and future generations.

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and its 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) adopted by world leaders in 2015, embody a roadmap for progress that is sustainable and leaves no one behind.

Achieving gender equality and women's empowerment is integral to each of the 17 goals. Only by ensuring the rights of women and girls across all the goals will we get to justice and inclusion, economies that work for all, and sustaining our shared environment now and for future generations.

This exam was conducted with the objective to provide the platform for students to prepare for NET/SET Examinations .

The exam was conducted in 5 parts i.e. 5 papers having 25 questions each in one part. Every day one question paper was shared with the candidates on Telegram Group which was created for this exam.

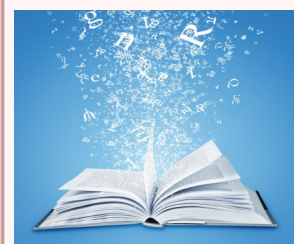
The papers for exam were divided into different topics such as General Knowledge, Communication, Higher Education System, Information Communication Technology, Research Aptitude Test. Total 1132 aspirants registered for this exam and 248 aspirants appeared for the exam. 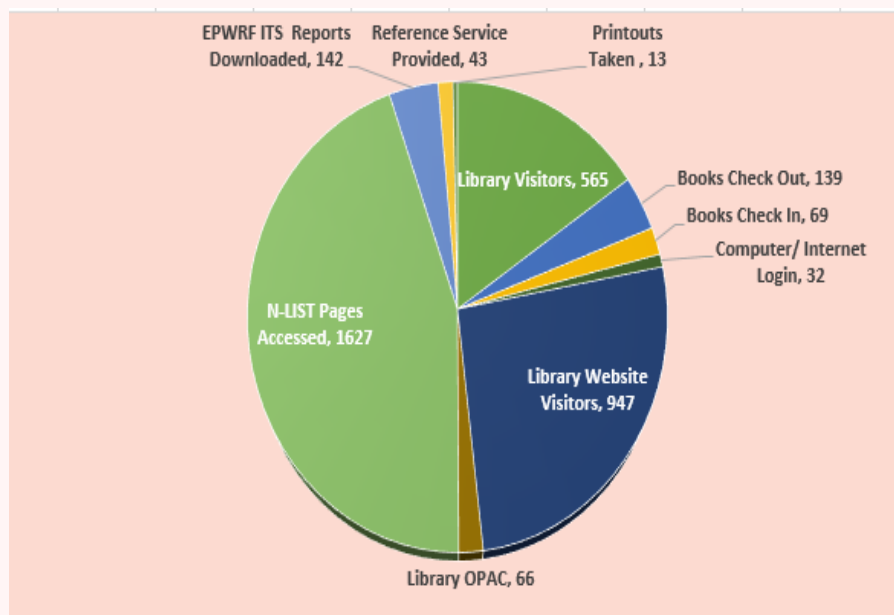

CiteSeer was the first digital library and search engine to provide automated citation indexing and citation linking by autonomous citation indexing.

CiteSeer was developed in 1997 at the NEC Research Institute, Princeton, New Jersey, by Steve Lawrence, Lee Giles and Kurt Bollacker. The service transitioned to the Pennsylvania State University's College of Information Sciences and Technology in 2003. Since then, the project has been led by Professor Lee Giles.

After serving as a public search engine for nearly ten years, CiteSeer, originally intended as a prototype only, began to scale beyond the capabilities of its original architecture. Since its inception, the original CiteSeer grew to index over 750,000 documents and served over 1.5 million requests daily, pushing the limits of the system's capabilities. Based on an analysis of problems encountered by the original system and the needs of the research community, a new architecture and data model was developed for the "Next Generation CiteSeer," or CiteSeerx, in order to continue the CiteSeer legacy into the foreseeable future.

CiteSeerx is an evolving scientific literature digital library and search engine that has focused primarily on the literature in computer and information science. CiteSeerx aims to improve the dissemination of scientific literature and to provide improvements in functionality, usability, availability, cost, comprehensiveness, efficiency, and timeliness in the access of scientific and scholarly knowledge. Rather than creating just another digital library, CiteSeerx attempts to provide resources such as algorithms, data, metadata, services, techniques, and software that can be used to promote other digital libraries. CiteSeerx has developed new methods and algorithms to index PostScript and PDF research articles on the Web.

CLIMATE CHANGE: 11 FACTS YOU NEED TO KNOW

We're already seeing the effects of climate change, but thankfully, the planet is equipped with a powerful tool for stabilizing the climate: nature itself. Protecting nature today means a better planet for future generations. Share these facts about climate change and help make a difference:

1. **416 parts per million:** The concentration of carbon dioxide (CO₂) in our atmosphere, as of July 2021, is the highest it has been in human history.
2. **2020 was a scorcher:** Analysis by NOAA shows that average global temperatures in 2020 were 1.76 degrees F (0.98 degrees C) warmer than the 20th century average — making it the second-hottest year on record. In fact, the seven warmest years in the 1880-2020 record have all occurred since 2014.

3. **11% of emissions:** Eleven percent of all global greenhouse gas emissions caused by humans are due to deforestation comparable to the emissions from all of the passenger vehicles on the planet.

4. **Nature is an untapped solution:** Tropical forests are incredibly effective at storing carbon, providing at least a third of the mitigation action needed to prevent the worst climate change scenarios. Yet nature-based solutions receive only 3% of all climate funding.

5. **Fight climate change, improve livelihoods — naturally:** Natural climate solutions such as restoring degraded forests could create as many as 39 jobs per million dollars spent — that's a job-creation rate more than six times higher than the oil and gas industry.

6. **July 2021 was the hottest month ever recorded:** According to NOAA, global temperatures in July 2021 were higher than any other July on record — making it likely the hottest month the world has seen since records began in 1880.

7. **800 million people:** Eleven percent of the world's population is currently vulnerable to climate change impacts such as droughts, floods, heat waves, extreme weather events and sea-level rise.

8. **Coastal ‘blue carbon’ ecosystems are critical:** Just 0.7% of the world's forests are coastal mangroves, yet they store up to 10 times as much carbon per hectare as tropical forests.

9. **800,000 hectares lost every year:** If we continue to lose mangroves at this rate, they may disappear within the next century. This loss, removes an important buffer from extreme weather for coastal communities and releases immense amounts of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

10. **Save nature.** It's cheaper: Conserving ecosystems is often more cost-effective than human-made interventions. In the Maldives, preserving the natural coral reef is four times cheaper than building a sea wall for coastal protection, even after 10 years of maintenance costs.

11. **189 nations on board:** 189 countries have ratified the 2015 Paris Agreement, agreeing to limit global warming and adapt to climate change, partly by protecting nature.

BONUS FACT

Price tag: US\$ 140 billion per year 18: This is what it would take to make the changes humanity needs to adapt to a warming world. It may sound like a lot, but it's less than 0.2% of global GDP. And the cost will only increase the longer we take to act ambitiously.

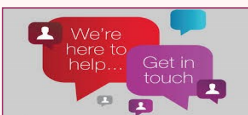
